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ANNUAL REPORT OF FIRE MARSHAL KEVIN J. KOWALSKI MAY 1, 2015

During the calendar year 2014 there was a total of 592 incidents responded to by the Simsbury Volunteer Fire Company. Of these incidents, 52 were investigated by this Office. Totals for the previous year, 2013 were 668 incidents and 54 investigations. This represents a decrease of 78 incidents and a decrease of two investigations. There were 2 fire-related injury reported to the Fire Marshal's Office.

During the calendar year 2014 there was a total of 1,334 inspections. This represents an decrease of 227 from the 2013 total of 1,561.

The 592 incidents include approximately \$139,900 in direct property loss. This compares to \$55,500 in 2013. To put this in perspective, this estimated loss is a loss based on protection of over 3 billion dollars' worth of assessed value property.

Additional notes:

- 1. The fire inspection program again achieved over 97% of its required inspections due to the efforts of Deputy Fire Marshal Patrick Tourville.
- 2. The public fire education program exceeded its goals last year with 28 classes; providing all-hazard training to over 2800 people. The fire extinguisher trailer continues to be used, training public and private employees as well as the citizens of Simsbury. The annual open house at the Main Station again exceeded previous attendance thanks to the participation of the members of the Fire Company. Additionally, the Fire Marshal's office with the exceptional assistance of the Fire Company and the Ladies Axillary sponsored a Pancake Breakfast in March for the Seniors of Simsbury. It was very well received and we were able to speak to the seniors about fire prevention and emergency services.
- 3. Building projects continue to increase and we are maintaining our goal to expedite the code reviews and provide quality inspections. These goals will assist the developers in bringing their projects in on time. It is expected that over 800 apartments will be completed over the next 2 years.
- 4. The Emergency Management Section reviewed the Emergency Operations Plan for the town again, made adjustments and submitted them to the state for approval. The Fire District again applied and received funding for the emergency manager and staff positions.
- 5. The Fire District has received a construction permit for a LPFM radio station with the call sign WSIM 103.5. The plans are to have a part time radio station broadcasting at least 18-20 hours a week. We expect to develop partnerships with the Town SCTV station and the School system for programing. The primary purpose is to be able to broadcast during emergencies to the citizens and visitors of Simsbury. The main studio will be on the second floor of the Main Fire Station. We expect to be broadcasting before the end of June 2015.

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- 6. The goal to replace the AS 400 system was completed during the first part of the FY13/14, due to the efforts of Captain Todd Kelley, the lead for our information management system. A technology committee will be established in FY15/16 to start the research for a complete new information system software program. The current software met our needs over the years since it was installed in 1991. While the software is upgraded continually, we want to position ourselves to meet new requirements in operations and ease standard input and be able to use more tablet interoperations. I would like to set as a goal to have the new, more modern system, up and running in the FY16/17 year.
- 7. I attended a Homeland Security sponsored course held at New Mexico Technical University on responding to terrorist bombings. This class completes the series on Terrorist bombings.
- 8. Finally I would like to thank the firefighters and officer corps who work for fire prevention each call they go to through positive reinforcement in taking every opportunity to speaking to children at the fire house or at calls about stop, drop and roll, not playing with matches, learning two ways out, etc. They also check for smoke detector batteries on calls, change them if necessary and provide support at the open house to further help keep the citizens safe from fire.
